After breakfast Bill and I headed north to Stoney Fork Campground. We set up camp and went into Forest Service in Wytheville. We had an hour and a half meeting with Harold - heads up the Fire Division for the USFS in our area. We got the tools ready for the weekend and did inventory of the equipment. In the evening we visited with Paul and Mary our hosts at Stoney Fork. Friday after breakfast at Virginia Heights Bill and I went to Gullion Mt. Bill took me on the short cut via Dan Quayle Drive. This allowed us to go up to the middle of the trail. We put in 5 Check Dams, sidehilled and cut out a blow down. We then headed back to camp.

Here is where I will diverse. All of the rest is colored by what happened on Saturday afternoon. When I check my e-mail last night, I saw the news about Billy Bob from Morgan Greer. I was stunned. How could this be? I was just with Billy Bob a few hours ago. I shouted for Sarah to come and read this. We just sat and cried. We had just lost a wonderful friend. Then my mind went back to the weekend. When we got back to camp, Billy Bob came into camp. He was so excited to be there. He left work early. He said that he had been working so much overtime that the county owed him. Billy saw Aslan and wanted to know all about her surgery and how she was doing. That is the way Billy was always concerned about his friends. We had a new member join us. It was her first trip. Billy as always was ready to help her set up her tent. He had her get a map so that he could show her an easier way to get to Wytheville from Elm City, NC. Rhonda talked about backpacking and Billy was ready to get her in the next hike. Billy was always ready to make a new member feel apart of PATH. It was time for supper. I rode with Billy to Wytheville. We talked about the weekend and things in the future. After supper, we returned to camp and sat and told stories for a few hours. Billy just relaxes when he gets to the trail. He is in "Heaven" there. Billy retired about 8:30 PM to get ready for the work ahead. Saturday morning we got up at 5:45 am and headed to Wytheville. We had about 25 people for breakfast. We had so much fun sharing stories over our meal. Bill Boudman and Billy Bob were the first to leave as they were going to Forest Service to get the tools for the workday. I had to return to Salisbury as Caroline, my granddaughter, was having her birthday party and I had to go to two baseball games. In there I also had a luncheon under a football game at Catawba College. Thus that is the last I saw of Billy Bob. He was going down the section of the trail he loved. In July he headed up a creek above the supply at Knot Maul. I know that those of you on this work trip will have memories of Saturday that you will cherish forever. Billy was everything to PATH. He was our plumber-"the Governor's Plumber," our cook, our storyteller, our backpacker organizer, our spiritual leader-"Father Bill," our inventor-made a new stove for Summerfest 2002, and so many other things. He was instrumental in organizing the Newcomers Meetings for new members. If we needed

He would show up on weekends with all kinds of things—fire hose to cut for covers of brush axes, new rock bars, Sledge hammers with unbreakable handles, the Orange Tart, and on and on. I keep thinking how I wish I could have been with Billy all day Saturday. However, I know that Billy was doing what he wanted to do right up to the end. I had 10 years of warm "fuzzies" and memories of Billy. We all have our stories of Billy. We have lost a wonderful friend. He truly lived and shared our love of the trail. Will miss you Billy, but I know that you will always be with us.

Bill gave the summary of the worktrip. We had 48 workers this weekend. September 30 marks the end of the trail year. I need you to send me any extra hours that you have working on the trail or on PATH business. I have to turn them in at that time. As of the second week in September we have over 6,300 volunteer hours. This does not include travel time and miscellaneous work done. It looks like we might reach the 11,000 hours we had last year. Bill was the best friend I ever had - not sure just how that happened in the all too brief 3 years I got to know him. It just did - but wasn't that the magic of our Billy Bob? Things just happened when he was involved, always for the better. His friendship got me through the difficult period after my Dad's death. When I felt like I'd lost such an important part of my life, he helped me stay positive, to get more deeply involved in PATH.

Bill was the selfless giver - never asking anything in return. And he was always so humble whenever I gave him something in return. He was my right arm at this year's Summerfest and many times my left arm too. Because I knew I could count on him, I took on the crew leadership role for Summerfest. Always the giver, he gave so I could give. He was our Iron Chef at Summerfest - cooking amazing meals for a tired crew when he'd worked as hard or harder than anyone else.

Bill let me borrow any outdoor equipment he had, "no need for you to go buy it when I've got one or an extra one - you go buy us something I don't have". He fixed me 2 adjustable poles for my Trekker tarp so when he couldn't go and I had to go solo backpacking, I'd still be able to set it up. (The tarp takes 4 hiking poles, the two of mine and the two of my hiking buddy Bill.)

He always fixed more than I could possibly eat - but I always tried, it was always soooo good. I can honestly say, when he provided the evening meals, I never lost a pound when I backpacked with Bill.

He always had a smile and a friendly greeting. I met him for the first time 3 years ago at Dawg Days. He gave me a great big bear hug, said "That's the way we do things at PATH" and asked me if I wanted a cold beer. Still a bit shocked, I took that beer. Boy aren't you and I going to miss those bear hugs?

He was consistently positive. Always able figure out how to get something accomplished when we tried to make it seem so hard or impossible.

I am thankful I got to hike all the way in to the Lynn Camp worksite with Bill. He and I took our time, talking and reminiscing about so many things, the wonderful ladies in our lives, family, our PATH family, this year's Olympic Washington trip, our mountain biking and backpacking plans for the first two weeks in October. As always he was looking forward, anticipating another trip to the outdoors we both loved. I will always treasure my last hike with Bill.

Like each of you have shared before me, I am so thankful to have been a part of such a wonderful friendship. I know Bill is having the best hike of his life, that he's sitting high up on a mountain ridgeline looking out on all the beauty before him. I also think he's watching to see what each of us does with what he tried to give and teach us and hoping we all can join him on another hike in our own time. I bet he'll have a bear hug and something cold to drink waiting for us!

Hike on my smiling, happy friend, you'll always hike beside me and I'll always have you in my heart when I hike.

We were all deeply saddened this weekend with the loss of long time trail volunteer - Bill Medlin. He was a multi talented individual. Sometimes he was Chief Cook and Bottle Washer, Privy Man, tool repairer and inventor. These were only a few of his many. He had many other talents which only long time friends knew about.

Bill Medlin was not only a personnel friend of mine but a personnel friend to all. He was the first person to greet or meet many of you on your arrival at Stony Fork or Sugar Grove, help you put up your tent, or provide you with refreshment. He was even into meal planning for back country trips and gave detailed instructions on how to prepare the meal. He introduced many of you to the backwoods or your first back packing experience.

Bill would even give advice to those of us that needed it. I cried on his shoulder many a night when my mother was ill and he shouldered the burden for me. He was a man of many strengths and will be deeply missed by all of us.

Billy Bob never said an ill or cross word to any creature on this earth. He loved everyone and I mean everyone. Even those of us that put holes in his tent, broke his equipment, or were slow to grasp his instructions of "do not touch." "Billy Bob," "Privy Man," "Governors Plumber" were only a few of the names that Willie Benjamin Medlin went by. Bill Medlin will be missed.

It was a privilege for us (the club) to have known and worked with Bill Medlin for all of these years.

We concentrated on two areas of work this work trip. One group went to Olystery to cook for the Trail Neighbors Picnic and the other group went to the area of Lynn Camp Creek. Both groups were very successful.

The cooking group prepared a fine meal for everyone and kept the food warm during our time of turmoil. The second group managed to build 4-5 rock water bars, unclog 4 feet of debris that was blocking a stream, clean 250 cubic feet of river bottom sediment out of a stream that was higher than the trail, and dig several oversized ditches to remove water from the old road bed.

A Gathering at Mt Rogers for PATH friends of "Billy Bob" Medlin

The family of Bill "Billy Bob" Medlin is preparing to carry out the final wishes of our friend Bill and scatter his ashes at the place he most loved to backpack, Mt Rogers NRA, VA. Bill's PATH family is invited to be a part of this final informal celebration. This email is to both invite you, his PATH family, and give you information about the weekend events.

Here's the plan...

Ceremony:

Schedule: Saturday Oct 26 at 1PM.

Location/Directions: The informal ceremony (less than an hour) will take place on a south-facing rock outcrop approximately 1 mile from the horse camp (corral) at Scales. At Scales the Crest Trail, AT, Scales Trail and VA Highlands Horse Trail all intersect. Proceed from the multiple trail intersection, N on the AT or West on the Crest Trail. The rock outcrop is located in an open area between the Crest Trail (actually a gravel road) and the AT, located lower down on the ridge. The site can be clearly seen from either of these 2 trails as they are only 1/4 mile apart at this location. Look for your PATH buddies that may have hiked in earlier.

Getting to the Memorial Site:

Mike Evans, Mt Rogers law enforcement officer, will meet PATH at 10AM at the Sugar Grove / Konnarock facility. He will escort 2 vehicles carrying Mickie, Jennifer and other family members up the Crest Trail to the memorial site.

PATH members may arrive using one of the following options:

- 1) Those camping at Mt Rogers can hike to the memorial site.
- 2) Anyone can come to Sugar Grove and catch a shuttle to Scales. This way we will limit the number of "full" PATH vehicles at Scales to about 8. The hike from Scales is about a mile.

NOTE: Shuttles (required since parking is limited) will leave between 10:30-11AM.

- 3) PATH members that want to hike in the 3-4 miles from VA603 may do so as a group. Please meet at Sugar Grove by 8:30AM on Friday and shuttle to the AT parking lot on VA603 about 1 mile west of Fairwood. Again, parking is very limited here too! The hike will take you approximately 2 1/2 - 3 1/2 hrs. depending on your hiking speed. Please be prepared and pack foul/cold weather gear, water and a snack or light lunch.

For those that have not done so, please email me (mitchela@squared.com) and let me know if you plan to attend the Oct. 26 weekend. That way we can determine how many shuttles are required to get everyone to Scales on time.

What to Wear/Bring:

The weather is unpredictable at anytime in the Mt Rogers NRA. Please be prepared! Wear proper gear for cool/cold breezy weather and be prepared for cold wind, rain or if we're lucky sun. Hiking boots/shoes are a good idea. Day packs with a snack and water are advisable. Remember this is an informal event which will include some

hiking so dress in comfortable attire.

Of course I would be remiss if I didn't mention Billy Bob's famous "prehydration / hydration lesson". "Bring plenty of water, preferably at least 2 quarts/liters if you are planning on hiking in and be sure to amply prehydrate the night before."

Weather:

It's looking good for Sat. but you should still be prepared for rain/mist/fog & 6-10 degrees colder.

Where to Stay:

PATH friends can stay at the USFS Konnarock Facility in Sugar Grove, VA on Friday and Saturday nights. Note: PATH uses the names Konnarock and Sugar Grove interchangeably. Sugar Grove is actually the town in VA and the USFS work center and the Konnarock facility are at the same location in Sugar Grove. (Directions to Sugar Grove are at the end of this email).

The Forest Service has allowed PATH members full facility access. You may stay in the sleeping pods or pitch your tent. Showers, bathrooms, kitchen and dining hall facilities are also available. Directions to the Konnarock / Sugar Grove location are included at the end of this email.

Some PATH friends are planning to backpack/camp at Mt. Rogers and hike in to the site for the ceremony.

In either case, please email me (mitchela@squared.com) with your plans (day of arrival, where you plan to stay) so we will be expecting you.

Evening Meal:

After the ceremony all PATH friends are invited back to the Konnarock Sugar Grove facility for a potluck evening meal. Wayne Riley is coordinating the details of the potluck meal. Please send Wayne an email to let us know what you will be bringing to share with Billy Bob's and your PATH families. Wayne's email: wbriley@mindspring.com.

Memory Sharing Time:

Between the ceremony and the evening meal, there will be displays of pictures and other remembrances of Billy Bob available in the dining hall for you to look at. If you have pictures of Billy Bob you'd like to share, please bring them for others to see. During and after the dinner, we would like to have informal telling of favorite, entertaining Billy Bob stories. The format will be to just stand up, get everyone's attention and tell your story. These are the stories that "make you smile" when you remember that big bear of a fun loving man he was to everyone!

Directions to USFS Sugar Grove Station (Konnarock Camp)
Sugar Grove phone# 540-677-4055 (by dining hall door)

Follow Interstate 81 to Marion, VA, which is 29 miles south of Wytheville, VA.
Get off at EXIT 45 when you get to Marion, VA.
Turn east (left) onto US 16 and go 10 miles until you come to the VA 601 intersection in the village of Sugar Grove, VA.
There is a very small sign (especially at night) for VA 601. Here, the most obvious sign is on the left and is for Hounds-Something-or-Other Campground.

(Note: If you're coming up on VA 16 from the direction of Sparta, NC and Troutdale VA the turn below will be a right. Then follow the remainder of the directions below to reach Sugar Grove).

Turn left onto VA 601 and go about a mile. Along the way there is a place where the road may appear to fork. Take the left fork.
After crossing a bridge turn left into the US Forest Service driveway on the left.
If you miss this signed driveway you'll come across another USFS sign but the gate there will be locked so turn around and come in at the first gate.

PATH Members,

The secretary-general Hartpence asked me to write a brief summary about the scattering of Billy Bob's ashes.

The scattering was at 1 pm on the 26th of October at a rock outcrop in Grayson Highlands State Park within proximity of the "Scales" horse corral. It was a Billy Bob kind of day, with brisk wind gusts, fog and short periods of brightening by the sun. In attendance were the family including Mickie Brooks, Billy Bob's significant other, and other members of the family, members of PATH, USFS and ATC. Andrew Mitchell presided in very fine fashion, Mickie read some touching poems and Kevin Mar told a Billy Bob story. Family and PATH members scattered the ashes. Attendees of special note were Teresa Martinez of ATC, longtime PATH members Hollyce and Marvin Kirkland, Mark Clayton from Austin, Texas, Karen Worthington of Seattle, WA, Jim Houk from Florida, Steve Williams, Nikola Dudley and numerous other PATH members totaling some 60+ people. Some backpacked in and camped over night, while others dayhiked in or walked in from Scales. Tim Eling of the USFS arranged an official escort of the family vehicles to within proximity of the rock outcrop and secured the area for the ceremony. They also kept the Sugar Grove Konnarock facility open for our use and ATC extended the phone service for us. There was an ample meal at Sugar Grove including some sampler Billy Bob trail meals following the ceremonies for the family and other attendees. Kim Wall did a good job of organizing the meal after Wayne Riley coordinated the menu over the PATH list. There were numerous remembrances of Billy Bob.
